

Historically Hove



- 1 **The Peace Statue** marks the boundary between Brighton & Hove. Just opposite the statue is a stunning example of modernist architecture – Embassy Court. Top tip: have a look at the railings as you pass from Brighton into Hove as they change colour.
- 2 **Hove Lawns** are the 'village green' area of the city: people come to relax and play here. There are often food markets and events happening along these lawns.
- 3 **Brunswick Square** is a beautiful Regency square dating back to the 1820s and this is where the Brunswick Festival is held each year in August.
- 4 **St Ann's Well Gardens** This picturesque park is home to a number of exotic trees, a scented garden, a playground and a fish pond. Back in the early 19th century George Albert Smith had a film studio within the gardens which is believed to have been the birthplace of film editing.
- 5 **Coral Greyhound Stadium** is a popular venue for a night out and it was here that the world famous "Ballyregan Bob" broke the world record for the highest number of consecutive wins (32)
- 6 **Booth Museum of Natural History** claims to have everything from Anthrax to Zebras! A local favourite which is well known for its collection of stuffed birds and dinosaur bones. Great for kids!
