Brighton and Hove Commemorative Plaque Panel (BHCPP)

Criteria for Assessing Nominations

All nominations for Blue Plaques will be assessed against the following criteria.

1. For proposals concerning famous or important people, the following criteria, in the judgement of the BHCPP, shouldbe met:

- **a.** A person nominated should have made a significant contribution to human welfare or happiness in a city-wide, national or international context.
- **b.** They should be regarded as eminent and distinguished by members of their own calling and/or be recognised for their work and achievements by the public.
- **c.** There should be a strong and clear association between the property and the proposed person e.g. place of birth, death or burial, childhood home, substantial period of residence, place of work.

2. Short term associations

a. Plaques are not normally erected to commemorate short term associations with buildings, unless the applicant can demonstrate the property is associated with a key event in the subject's life.

3) Proposals for the commemoration of buildings or sites may be welcomed on the grounds that:

a. an historical event of particular importance occurred there

or

b. the building had an important historical significance that is not obvious from its present appearance, use or any existing commemoration.

4) Time Lapse

a. The time lapse between date of death and nomination should normally be at least 20 years or a sufficient period to allow for an appropriate assessment of the subject's life and work.

5) Balance and Range

- a. The BHCPP will take into account the current geographical distribution of plaques across the city.
- b. A Blue Plaque would not normally be considered for someone who is already commemorated by a Blue Plaque in the city or elsewhere.
- c. A Blue Plaque would not normally be considered for someone if the person nominated is already commemorated in the city in some other way.
- d. Proposals may be considered for plaques commemorating more than one person, providing:

- (i) there is an overarching theme or connection and/or
- (ii) each figure is significant in their own right.
- e) No listed building should have more than one Blue Plaque.

6) The siting of a Blue Plaque

- a. A plaque must be clearly visible from the public highway and should be erected on a building and not on a boundary wall or gate pier. For this reason, the plaque must be at ground floor (or raised ground floor level) rather than the basement.
- b. A plaque will usually be placed on a building's fabric that is contemporary with or pre-dates the association being commemorated i.e. has the building been radically altered since the nominee lived there?
- c. The ultimate siting of the Plaque will be determined by the BHCPP.
- d. The BHCPP may decide that an alternative commemoration or initiative is more appropriate.
- e. The wording of the Plaque is ultimately decided by the BHCPP.

7) Other considerations

- a. Animals and fictitious characters will not be considered for commemoration.
- b. An application should be accompanied by relevant dates and information regarding the nomination including details of achievements and association with the property.
- c. An application for a person cannot be considered if a previous application was rejected by the BHCPP within the last five years.
- d. The BHCPP will consider an application within twelve months of it being submitted, on a first come first served basis.
- e. If an application, in the view of the BHCPP, has clear merit but lacks information required by the Panel, the Panel may provide the assistance needed by the applicant.
- f. The BHCPP can make a nomination in its own right.
